Apostleship of the Sea Our oceans and seas are in the news a great deal at the moment as people try to cross them, dive under them, build turbines on them or exploit their mineral wealth. The vast majority of our material trade with other countries is seaborne. Massive cargo vessels bring in the

food we eat, many of the cars we drive, the clothes we wear, the flat pack furniture we assemble. We might be about as far from the sea as it is possible to be in England, but we still rely on what is traded over the waters.

The crews who sail between different countries may stay at sea for months at a time and many come from Christian countries where their faith is strong. The Apostleship of the Sea helps provide chaplains who can support those both on shore and on their vessels at harbour. They offer Mass, pray with individuals, offer counsel, even warm clothes as many come from Tropical regions and find English ports a little cool.
